#### MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Dear Neighbors,

Greetings; Hopefully by the time you receive this newsletter we will be through the cold spells and anticipating all the fun and excitement of summer on Lake Minnetonka!

Water Quality Update. In March 2021, utility customers were notified of manganese levels in the City water supply that exceed EPA and MN Dept of Health advisory levels. Updated information is on the "City News" tab on our website and includes advice on how you can manage this concern at the household level (softening, filtering, bottled water, etc.) while we explore city-wide solutions.

In May of 2021, City Engineers presented a study detailing what investments would be required to remove the manganese from our City water supply at an estimated cost of \$25M, which would raise our current debt level by over 50%!

In the fall of 2021, the City presented our needs to both the Senate and House Capital Investment Committees and proposed language to fund our project is part of the 2022 bonding bill currently under consideration. While this is a significant step, the legislative process for this type and amount of funding is not guaranteed. We have gotten great support from our local representatives, but it never hurts for them to hear from you on the importance of the project, including to avoid the additional burden of higher utility bills and to correct a problem that the City did not create.

Island Park Village Hall Revitalization Update. A group of dedicated citizens is behind an effort to revitalize the Island Park Village Hall located at 4843 Manchester Road. The vision is to return it to its original purpose as a central gathering spot for community events, big and small. The Island Park Village Hall Preservation Society (IPVHPS) is a tax exempt non-profit seeking donations and grants to fund the restoration. On Saturday, May 21st, the IPVHPS is hosting an inaugural 'Family Fun Day' at the Village Hall and in Swenson Park. **STAFFING UPDATE.** Mound Fire Administration is proud to announce Jake D. Stuhr was hired as a probationary firefighter on March 7, 2022. Jake or 'J.D.' is a Mound resident and a graduate of Mound Westonka High School. Maintaining our active firefighting crew is critical to department success. The Mound Fire Staff of active firefighters is now at 41, which creates an outstanding response team for our community.

**NEW LIFE-SAVING TOOL.** MFD recently purchased a LUCAS 3.1 Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) automated chest compression system. In 2021, the Fire Department responded to 442 medical-rescue calls, 99 with possible heart issues and 80 with unconscious individuals. Consistent CPR is difficult for even highly trained personnel to sustain over time. The LUCAS device can be applied on a patient quickly and will deliver consistent uninterrupted automatic chest compressions to patients in cardiac arrest. The \$18,500 purchase was made possible



from funds raised at the Fire House Dance this past October, Auxiliary fundraisers, and private donations. A BIG thank you to the Mound Fire Department Relief Association, the Mound Fire Auxiliary and other private donors!

**RECREATIONAL FIRES SHOULD NOT BE ANNOYING TO NEIGHBORS!** Mound has an ordinance that allows recreational fires. The ordinance is in place for the enjoyment and safety of all parties.


#### The following general requirements shall apply to all recreational fires:

- The fire shall be attended by a competent, unimpaired adult who is able to call 911 at all times.
- A means to control and/or extinguish the fire shall be immediately available to the attendant at the site of the fire at all times during burning (hand tools, hose lines, and water buckets).
- Only dry fire wood and starter fuels may be burned in a recreational fire.
- No trash, construction lumber or green treated wood is allowed in a recreational fire.
- The fire may not be started or continued in situations where prevailing winds or other factors create an unsafe condition or direct smoke toward other nearby residences.
- The fire area may not be more than 3 ft. square and the flame maximum of 2 ft. high.
- Permanent in-ground fire pits shall be located 25 feet from any structure or combustible material.
- A portable fire pit shall be located 15 feet from any structure or combustible material.
- Recreational fires may be conducted between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 2:00 a.m.

#### Recreational fires shall not be allowed, if any of the following conditions exist:

- The fire is left unattended, or the attendant is impaired.
- A fire hazard exists or develops
- Pollution or nuisance conditions develop
- The fire is smoldering with no flame visible and is unattended.

## HOUSEHOLD ORGANICS RECYCLING DROP OFF SITE LAUNCHED!



Mound residents can now take advantage of a free residential organics drop-off site located in the parking lot in front of the main entrance to the Centennial Building at 5341 Maywood Road.

Organics recycling has the potential of reducing an estimated 30% of trash that goes into landfills and incinerators. Keeping organic material out of landfills reduces greenhouse gas emissions and converts 'useless' food waste into valuable, nutrient-rich soil.

Hennepin County recommends focusing on food scraps as that is the most common material in the trash and the most nutrient-rich material in the composting process. **Other tips:** 

- Countertop kitchen pails with vented lids lined with a compostable bag is most ideal. Vented containers allow moisture to evaporate which will reduce odors and help compostable bags hold up longer.
- **Drain excess liquids** before placing food scraps in collection container. Keep 'wet' organics in the refrigerator or freezer, or place paper towels or newspaper at the bottom of the container. This all helps to slow the decomposition of food, reduce odors, prevent flies, and help the compostable bags last longer.
- Study the Organics Recycling Guide and know what is acceptable for organics recycling. Contamination is the #1 reason recycling fails. Unacceptable materials for organics recycling include plastic bags, yard waste, hazardous waste (paint, pesticides, etc.) plastics and plastic coated paper, diapers, baby wipes, bandages, dryer sheets, fast food wrappers, etc.

Organics recycling can help residents reduce the amount of trash sent to the landfill/incinerator. Many participants in organics recycling find that when they pull organics out of the trash they are able to get a smaller trash cart and reduce garbage fees.

The organics drop-off is free of charge, but residents must register. Once registered, participants receive instructions and the lock combination/key for the organics recycling dumpster. In addition, participants will receive information on getting started and 5 complementary compostable bags. Additional bags are available for purchase at most hardware stores and on-line. Using compostable bags (never plastic!) is the key to a successful pilot program! Register at cityofmound.com or call (952)472-0603 for details.

# **Public Works Update**

When you travel on a city street or take a stroll on the sidewalk, you are benefiting from services provided by the City of Mound's Public Works Department. This team manages our streets, parks, water, sewer and storm sewer infrastructure. Their mission is to provide safe, professional services while enhancing the quality of life for all who live, work and visit our community.

#### Annual Hydrant Flushing April 25th through May 27th



Hydrant flushing is an important preventative maintenance activity that verifies proper operation of the hydrant and ensures adequate water flow. It also removes sediment and deposits that naturally accumulate. Please check water before doing laundry and <u>do not</u> try to run the tap to flush out any coloration—it just needs time to resettle.

#### Other Reminders

- Free dump station for RV's located at Public Works Facility at 5468 Lynwood Blvd. on the west side of the building on Belmont Lane, directly across from the Post Office driveway. A tee handle key is needed to turn on the water and is available at hardware stores.
- Watercraft must be moored at City nonabutting dock and slip sites by June 15th
- City canoe/kayak racks located around the lake have spots available for rent (\$65/ season for Mound residents)

### MN Dept of Health Consumer Confidence Report for the City of Mound Water System now available



The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency sets safe drinking water standards. These standards limit the amounts of specific contaminants allowed in drinking water in order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink.

**DID YOU KNOW?** Minnesota's primary drinking water sources are groundwater and surface water. Groundwater is the water found in aquifers beneath the surface of the land and this supplies 75% of Minnesota's drinking water. The other 25% comes from surface water found in lakes, rivers and streams. The City of Mound drinking water comes from two wells ranging from 304 to 317 feet deep, that draw water from the Prairie Du Chien-Jordan and Quaternany Buried Unconfined aquifers.

#### Consider serving as an election judge for the 2022 midterm elections!

Election judges administer voting procedures to ensure a fair and accessible election for all eligible voters. The City of Mound is always looking for qualified voters to act as election judges. Requirements include: must be eligible to vote in Minnesota, must be able to read, write, and speak English, cannot be a spouse, parent, child, or sibling of any election judge serving in the same precinct, and cannot be a candidate or the spouse, parent, child, or sibling of any candidate on the ballot in that precinct.

Election judges go through a two-hour training and are compensated for their service. The City is seeking judges able to help with early voting and all judges must be able to work on the Aug. 9 primary election day and November 8 general election day — full-day shifts are from 6 am to approx. 9 pm, with 1/2 day shifts available.
