The City Council toured the Westonka Historical Society museum in March, where we learned more about the rich history of the Mound Westonka area. We are grateful to the Historical Society for their ongoing efforts to preserve and share our community's heritage. I encourage everyone to visit the museum on any Saturday from 10:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m. or by appointment.

Students from the Student Council Senate have been invited to give the City Council monthly updates on Mound Westonka High School happenings. Representatives presented at meetings in February, March, and April, and will again in May and then start back up in the fall.

In order to increase transparency in our city government, similar to our City Council meetings, we are now recording all Planning Commission meetings and making them available for streaming and viewing on your local government channels. Meeting minutes will remain available online. Go to cityofmound.com/mayor-council and click on the "LMCC-TV Video Stream" on the left-hand menu to view all Planning and Council Meetings. Additional communication initiatives being considered are improvements to e-mail/texting tools for E-news between quarterly newsletters with links to enhanced resources on the city website. The goal is to ensure residents are well informed and have easy access to information. Stay tuned for more details on these advancements.

We will soon see an increase of construction activity in our community. We have a few holdover projects from 2022 to complete such as the pavement improvements at Surfside and the downtown sidewalk repairs. The watermain replacement on Lynwood Blvd/County 15 should be complete by mid-May and the second phase of downtown sidewalk improvements will start this summer. We are excited to see the Artesa 52-unit Co-op starting; which brings the permanent closing of Auditors Road. The Met Council and Hennepin County also have projects in the area. Crimes of Opportunity

Crimes of opportunity tend to increase in the warmer months, including thefts from auto, burglaries and smash and grabs from cars. We ask that you be vigilant in not leaving items of value in your vehicle, lock your cars at night, shut and lock garage doors, garage access doors and out-buildings. A recent trend is using the garage door opener from unlocked vehicles to open the attached overhead garage door and entering the home through the interior service door.

Speeding Enforcement

A frequent concern, particularly in the summer, is unsafe vehicle traffic in residential neighborhoods. Orono Police Department uses education as our first tool, but citations may also be issued and often go to residents who live in that very neighborhood. It all starts with you and creating a culture of safety. Talk with neighbors about safe driving and if warranted, you may request a “speed sign or speed trailer” in your neighborhood by calling our administrative office at 952-249-4700 to assist the OPD in data gathering in order to create an appropriate action plan.

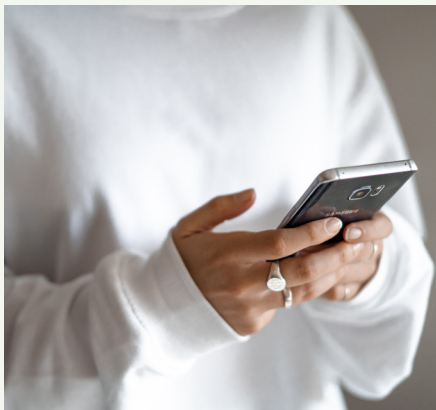


Additional Services

The Orono Police Department offers a youth (12+) firearms safety course which is DNR approved (register by June 30 for August course), child car seat practitioners who offer clinics or individual consultations to ensure proper child car seat installation, and fingerprinting. We perform the mandatory criminal fingerprints for individuals under arrest, but we also offer civil fingerprints for residents and businesses which can be required for some jobs, licensing or other matters.

Now Seeking Next Class of Police Explorers

The Orono Police Explorer Program runs annually from September through April, and meets once a week with a couple of weekend conferences. The Explorer program is a great way to introduce young people to a potential career in the criminal justice field. 


Sign Up for Emergency Alerts

The City of Mound uses RAVE Mobile Safety to send city-wide or neighborhood specific emails, texts, or phone calls (depending on user preference) to alert residents and businesses of emergency alerts, watermain breaks, and changes to the city code under consideration. Users are encouraged to sign-up on cityofmound.com. The OPD has their own notification system that residents and businesses are also encouraged to sign-up for called “Notify Me”. Maintenance Permits Close-Out Initiative

MNSPECT, Mound's contracted Department of Building Safety, has begun placing door hangers on properties with outstanding maintenance permits. Often re-roofing/siding or furnace/water heater replacement projects get completed but the final inspection is never ordered and the permit closed out. The inspections typically last less than 10 minutes and are meant to ensure the job was completed according to code, which protects the property owner during the warranty period. MNSPECT has implemented a new on-line building permit system to increase efficiency and transparency for city staff, property owners, contractors and subcontractors. Since Mound is considered fully developed, there has always been steady interest in improving our existing housing stock and building permits are meant to ensure additions and alterations to properties are done according to code. Mound Artessa, the 52-unit cooperative living community will begin construction in May and is scheduled to be completed by fall of 2024. The Council approved a concept plan for the remainder of the area that is to become Mound's central downtown community gathering space. Auditor's Road will be closed early in the process to make way for the critical infrastructure improvements needed to accommodate the new residence and expansion of public gathering spaces, but the farmers market will not be interrupted at any phase of construction.

Hydrant Flushing Now Through May 26

Public Works completes hydrant flushing once a year in the spring for two critical reasons: to verify system flow levels are adequate to support critical fire protection activities and to purge the system of rust sediments that form from the natural iron content in our source water aquifers. Flushing may temporarily cause discoloration in the household water supply and it is important to note that trying to run the faucet for an extended time will not "flush out" the sediment. The sediment must settle in the pipes, prior to delivering clear water into your home. This just takes time and we appreciate your patience!

Responsible Yard Management Protects Water Quality

Best management practices to improve the health of your lawn and protect water quality include: taking a soil test to know what fertilizers your lawn needs, setting your mower to a high setting (3-4" tall) to promote deep roots and aid water and nutrient retention, applying fertilizers and herbicides according to the label and when they will be most effective, and sweeping up clippings and other materials from hard surfaces to keep out of storm sewers. While native grasses and flowers are acceptable to some, others prefer a manicured lawn and landscaping; either way, healthy lawns - in all their forms - promote healthy water.

Clean Water Education & Rain Barrel Distribution Event on June 3

A dedicated group of community volunteers wanting to raise awareness of how households can contribute to keeping our lakes and public waterways clean through landscaping and water conservation techniques coordinated a rain barrel sale with RecycleMinnesota.org. The supply quickly sold out and lucky participants who completed their order in time can pick them up at a special event being held at the parking ramp next to Mound True Value on Saturday, June 3 from 8:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Everyone is invited to stop by to learn more about the program. Improper Disposal of Pet Waste Effects Water Quality & Public Health

Picking up after your pets on public and private property keeps our city clean and beautiful, prevents harmful nutrients from entering waterways, and keep pets and people healthy. Dispose of pet waste in a designated pet container or trash; never in storm drains, waterways, or the composting drop-off site, as contamination and environmental damage can occur. MN Department of Health (MDH) 2022 Consumer Confidence Report

MN Department of Health (MDH) 2022 Consumer Confidence Report for the City of Mound Water System has been released and posted to the city website at cityofmound.com/water-quality-reports. You may also review or obtain a copy from City Hall. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency sets safe drinking water standards. These standards limit the amounts of specific contaminants allowed in drinking water to ensure tap water is safe to drink.

Residential Organics Recycling Drop-Off Site Update

Over 80 households have registered to participate in this free program but we are looking for more! Organics recycling has the potential of reducing an estimated 30% of trash that goes into landfills and incinerators. Keeping organic material out of landfills reduces greenhouse gas emissions and converts 'useless' food waste into valuable, nutrient-rich soil. The drop off is located in the parking lot of the Centennial Building at 5341 Maywood Road. Please register at City Hall to receive a starter kit and educational information. Countertop kitchen pails with vented lids are \$5.

General Reminders

- **Free RV dump station** is located at the Public Works Facility (5468 Lynwood Blvd.) on the west side of the building on Belmont Lane, directly across from the Post Office driveway. A tee handle key is needed to turn on the water and is available at hardware stores.
- **Mound Dock Program:** 2023 official waitlist has been published on the website. Watercraft must be moored at City non-abutting dock and slip sites by June 15 .
- **City canoe/kayak racks** located around the lake have spots available for rent (\$65/season for Mound residents, \$90 for non-residents). Call Kevin at 952-472-0613 for more info or see website.

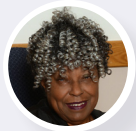
